Pittsfield Elementary Launches New Reading Curriculum

The educators at Pittsfield Elementary are enthusiastically launching the new reading curriculum HMH Into Reading. Kristen White became principal in 2023 and during her first year she led an exploration of six possible reading curriculum packages. Two were selected for a two-month examination by the full teaching staff, the teachers then voted for their selection. HMH was overwhelmingly chosen; teachers were especially impressed with the curriculum's ability to develop a student's love of reading through engaging reading materials.

HMH Into Reading uses time proven strategies to establish effective instruction for reading, verbal communication and writing. The curriculum includes sections for word-work (phonics and vocabulary),

reading and writing. Use of a common curriculum throughout the school will support student learning methods that can be tailored to each student's skill and ability.

In preparation for launching HMH, Pittsfield Elementary revised its schedule and how students were assigned to classrooms making sure every classroom has a paraeducator. The new schedule allows Title One teachers to work in the classroom during reading and writing, providing additional support to students who may need it. (Title One is a federally funded program whose goal is to help all children receive a high-quality education and close educational achievement gaps.)

Teachers are actively engaged in HMH, and are provided in-person and online professional development, quided by PES fourth grade teacher Heather Galley and reading specialist Nicole Davis. So far, students especially enjoy the weekly vocabulary words.

Principal Kristen White was truly drawn to Pittsfield when a student group led a section of the finalist interview process (yes the students were guided and supported by adults!). The students unanimously picked Kristen for their nominee, and Kristen picked Pittsfield. Her eight years of elementary teaching experience, and seven combined years as an assistant principal and principal built a strong foundation for a successful transfer to PES where "everyone cares and we do what's best for our kids."

Tuesday September 24, 6pm - The Board of Selectmen is working with the NH Bureau of **Emergency Communications to correct nonstandard** addressing across town to help public safety agencies easily locate and respond in an emergency. Letters were mailed Friday, August 30, 2024, to affected property owners. A second batch of letters were mailed Friday, September 6, 2024 and Friday, September 13, 2024. The property owners are strongly encouraged to email Cara Marston at cmarston@pittsfieldnh.gov to be placed on an email notification list and to receive any further address-specific details that may be available beyond the letters that were mailed. There will be several steps to this e-911 addressing correction project that will take place over the course of a few months. First, the Board of Selectmen will hold a meeting at their Tuesday September 24, 2024 regular 6pm meeting (being held in the PMHS lecture hall at 23 Oneida Street) to discuss the need for the changes. After this meeting, it will be determined which addresses will be changed by voluntary re-addressing agreements and which ones will have to go through a public hearing process to be changed.

Survivor of the 9/11 attacks, Dr. Sharon MacIntyre came to tell her story to the ninth grade world history classes on Wednesday, September 11, 2024, Dr. MacIntyre was working on the 14th floor of World Trade Tower 1 on the morning of the September 11 attacks. She recapped the events of that day from a first person perspective for the students. The students asked many good questions and were captivated by the emotional impact of the day.

Cook's Corner Apple Turnovers

Yay, apple season is upon us! And to the rescue – frozen puff pastry sheets! These turnovers are super easy and fun to make. I bet the kiddos and grand-kiddos would enjoy

making these. I use Granny Smith apples because I like their tartness, but Honeycrisp or Pink Lady apples work well. You might like include mix pears in with your apples; or add raisins or dried cranberries to your apple mixture in the saucepan. Whatever you decide to do, just make these soon. Serve warm with good quality ice cream. These are also fabulous for breakfast. Bon appetit! - MP Christakos

1 (17.3 oz) package frozen puff pastry sheets, thawed, but cold

3 to 4 large Granny Smith apples, peeled, cored and diced into ½ inch pieces

34 cup packed light brown sugar

2 TBSP butter

2 tsp cornstarch

1 tsp lemon juice

1 tsp water

½ tsp ground cinnamon

For the egg wash: 1 large egg and 1 tsp water

For the glaze: 1 cup powdered sugar, 2 TBSP whole milk, $\ensuremath{\rlap/}_2$

tsp vanilla extract

Heat oven to 450. Line 2 baking sheets with parchment paper.

In a medium saucepan, stir together apples, brown sugar, butter, cornstarch, lemon juice, water and cinnamon and cook on medium-low, stirring frequently until butter is melted. Increase heat to medium and simmer the mixture for 7 minutes, stirring frequently until it has thickened. Set aside to cool slightly.

On top of a large piece of parchment paper or lightly floured surface, unfold the thawed pastry dough. Roll each sheet into a 12 inch square, then cut each square into 4 squares. Transfer the squares to the prepared baking sheets.

Prepare the egg wash by whisking together the egg and water. Divide the apple filling among the pastry squares, placing in the center. Brush the edges of the pastry with the egg wash. Fold dough in half over the filling, forming a triangle. Press edges of pastry to seal and crimp with a fork. Cut 3 small slits on the top of each turnover. Brush the tops with the remaining egg wash. Bake for 23 to 28 minutes or until golden brown. Let cool a few minutes before glazing. Prepare the glaze by mixing the sugar, milk and vanilla extract together until smooth. Drizzle the turnovers with the glaze.

Catamount Womenaid News

Mission: Catamount Womenaid provides financial assistance for individuals in the community in times of need.

Since 2011, Catamount Womenaid has helped residents of area towns who need funds for essentials such as rent, utilities, clothing, medical and dental bills and transportation. When individuals or families have emergencies beyond what social agencies can meet, Catamount Womenaid will consider requests for funds made on their behalf. Requests for assistance come from validated community resources such as social services organizations, school nurses and guidance counselors, clergy or doctors' offices; the recipients remain anonymous.



In its 13 years of existence, Catamount Womenaid has grown to serve 6 towns and dozens of neighbors in need each year. This year, it has been able to increase its level of aid; Catamount Womenaid now grants up to \$1,000 for requests for residents of Barnstead, Deerfield, Epsom, Northwood, Pittsfield and Strafford. Those outside of this area may receive up to \$500 in approved grants. Catamount Womenaid also works directly with staff at the 6 elementary and 2 high schools in the area so they have funds on hand when students need clothes or school supplies.

Generous community members have made the mission of Catamount Womenaid attainable. Board members proudly state that no request for aid has ever been turned down due to lack of funds. It is expected that by the end of 2024, Catamount Womenaid will have dispersed \$125,000 in total!
