On Sunday, Nov. 24, the day the wind blew nearly all day and Concord reported 39 mile-per-hour gusts, the Pittsfield Fire Department made an outstanding stop. The Department responded to a structure fire on Loudon Road minutes after the alarm was sounded.

Pittsfield, with the help of our neighboring mutual aid communities, had the fire under control within 40 minutes. Considering the fact that many folks were visiting family and friends before the holiday is even further testimony to their dedication and professionalism last Sunday. The homeowners were away when the fire started and no firemen were injured during the process of putting the fire out, despite a wild, unpredictable wind pushing the flames dangerously across the scene. The family dog was uninjured and saved from the flames.

We are indeed fortunate to have such devoted people serving the town of Pittsfield, and on Sunday all of their training and hard work paid off. The members of the Pittsfield Select Board would like to express our gratitude for a job well done. *Jim Adams*, Pittsfield Select Board

Tax Bills Come With a Surprise

Shock and awe. That's what most of us felt on opening our property tax bills this season. Almost every property owner saw a substantial and unexpected rise in the amount owed. A rise due in December is challenging for everyone. It is seriously difficult for many. After five or six years of nearly flat municipal budgets and stability in the tax rate, this rise comes as a jolt, but it is no one's fault. The Select Board, the Budget Committee, the department heads, and the various committee chairs have worked diligently to keep the taxes as low as possible and still provide the quality of services that Pittsfield residents expect and deserve.

At present, factors beyond anyone's control have swept in and immediately limited our ability to 'hold the line' in the way we all have become accustomed. Inflation sent the cost of everything soaring. For example: the cost of asphalt paving material for our road and sidewalk projects rose from \$70 per ton to \$150 per ton in less than six months. Multiple sudden storms damaged culverts and drainage all over town. Fuel costs remained high throughout the year. Sending one newly hired police officer to the New Hampshire Police Academy costs municipal governments \$65,000. We also incurred the expense of three elections in 2024—Municipal, Primary, and the General. This year, and likely next year as well, (2025 is a year for periodic property reassessment) is a perfect storm of expenses.

To mitigate some of the impact ahead, the Select Board has voted some drastic steps to get the property owners some relief. We have decided to remove \$85,000 worth of highway and sidewalk projects from the 2025 budget. We will recommend to the voters that we have a one year moratorium on all contributions to the Capital Improvement Plans. This amounts to \$545,000 in the year 2025. The combination is a \$630,000 reduction in the municipal budget for 2025.

There is risk to this course of action. It will take years to restore the CIP accounts to where they must be whenever it comes time to replace required equipment. And we will be unable to continue with our successful campaign to maintain the road network and restore the sidewalks that link the downtown area and the schools. However, the Select Board feels that it is critical in the near term to reduce some of the tax burden our people face now. And as always we will be looking for any other savings as we move forward. It is our hope that in 2026 and beyond we will be able to restore the budget to cover the needed array of line items. *J. C. Allard* Pittsfield Select Board



Cook's Corner Chicken Cutlets with Creamy Pesto & Tomatoes and Provencal Bread

With "turkey day" behind us, I bet you're all looking for something different for dinner. You've come to the right spot. These two recipes are easy and absolutely delicious. If you plan to serve the chicken cutlets over pasta, you may want to double the sauce ingredients. Now for the bread

recipe, as you might imagine, I enjoy watching cooking shows. Several years ago I saw a program where the famous chef, Jacques Pepin, was showcasing recipes from his childhood in the south of France. One idea he shared was this Provencal Bread. It is so simple and yet so delicious and comforting. It will remind you of Italian focaccia. It's a great side for pasta, salad or soup. I like to sprinkle fresh grated Parmesan cheese on this bread before serving, which is best served warm. Bon Appetit mes amis! MP Christakos

Chicken Cutlets with Creamy Pesto & Tomatoes

1 lb chicken cutlets

14 tsp salt, divided

¼ tsp pepper, divided

1 TBSP olive oil

½ cup finely chopped red onion

½ cup dry white wine

½ cup heavy cream

¼ cup prepared pesto

1 medium roma tomato, chopped

2 TBSP chopped, fresh basil

Sprinkle chicken with 1/8 tsp salt and 1/8 tsp pepper. Heat oil in a large skillet over medium-high heat. Add chicken and cook, turning once, until browned and cooked through, about 6 minutes total. Transfer chicken to a plate and keep warm.

Add onion to the pan. Cook, stirring for 1 minute. Increase heat to high and add wine. Cook, scraping up browned bits, until liquid is reduced, about 2 minutes. Reduce heat to medium and stir in cream, any accumulated juices from chicken and remaining 1/8 tsp salt and pepper.

Stir in pesto and tomatoes then return chicken to the pan. Turn to coat; cook until heated through, about 1 to 2 minutes.

Sprinkle the chicken with the fresh chopped basil before serving.

Provencal Bread - from Jacques Pepin

1 (1 lb) bag of fresh pizza dough

Cornmeal, for dusting

Olive oil, for brushing

1 TBSP Herbes de Provence

Let pizza dough sit on the counter for 30 to 45 minutes.

Line a rimmed baking sheet with tin foil. Spread out the dough on the baking sheet, using your hands to form a large oval shape. Make 4 diagonal slices in the dough, cutting all the way through the dough. Using your fingers, open up the slices a bit.

Let the dough sit on the counter for another 30 to 45 minutes.

Sprinkle the top of the dough with a light dusting of cornmeal. Then brush the entire top with olive oil. Season with coarse salt and black pepper and sprinkle the top with Herbes de Provence.

Bake in a 450 degree oven for 20 to 25 minutes.

If you can't find Herbes de Provence, use a mix of dried basil, oregano, thyme and dill.
